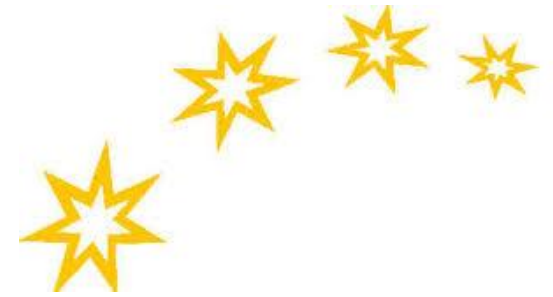

Summer Term

Week 1- 13th April **White/Gold cloth on worship table**

<p>Monday Worship</p> <p>Focus: Welcome back and recap of vision and values.</p> <p>Organisation: sit in rows</p>	<p>Welcome: Children to enter to "The Lord is my shepherd" by Stuart Townsend - The Lord's My Shepherd - Stuart Townend Light the candle and open with the school liturgy. Explain worship is to be inclusive, invitational and inspirational.</p> <p>Learn: Begin with a welcome and a reflection on the Easter holidays. After Easter, Christians remember how Jesus' friends felt full of new hope. They had seen something amazing: that love is stronger than fear, kindness is stronger than hate, and light is stronger than darkness. That message is at the heart of our school motto. When we say "<i>Shine Like Stars</i>," we're saying that every one of us can bring light into the world through our words, our actions, and our choices.</p> <p>Tell the story - The Road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35). This story shows us something important: Sometimes we shine brightest not by doing something huge, but by walking with someone, listening, showing kindness, and choosing hope even when things feel difficult.</p> <p>Show the 5 school values and ask pupils in teams to consider how these values were shown in the story.</p> <p>Respect - The friends on the road listened to the stranger. They didn't interrupt or ignore him. Respect begins with listening, really listening, to others.</p> <p>Compassion - Jesus walked with them when they were sad. Compassion means noticing when someone needs help and choosing to care.</p> <p>Hope - The story turns from sadness to joy. Hope is believing that things can get better, even when we can't see how yet.</p> <p>Integrity - The friends were honest about how they felt. Integrity means being truthful, doing the right thing even when no one is watching.</p> <p>Perseverance - They walked a long journey, and when they discovered the truth, they didn't give up—they ran all the way back to share the good news. Perseverance is keeping going, even when it's tough.</p> <p>Respond: How can this help us shine like stars this term? Take ideas and share own. Then sing Shine Jesus Shine Worship Song with Lyrics Vineyard Music</p> <p>Reflect: Let's take a quiet moment. Think of one way you can shine this week. Maybe it's helping someone new. Maybe it's trying your best in a subject you find tricky. Maybe it's being brave enough to say sorry or to forgive. Hold that thought in your mind like a little star.</p> <p><i>Dear God, Thank you for bringing us safely back to school. Help us to shine like stars - to show respect, compassion, hope, integrity, and perseverance in everything we do. Walk with us, just as Jesus walked with his friends on the road. Amen.</i></p> <p>Take Away/next steps: As we go into this new term, remember: You don't have to be the biggest or the loudest to shine. You shine by being kind, by being brave, by being you. Go and shine like stars today.</p>
<p>Tuesday Worship</p> <p>Focus: Intro to British Values</p> <p>Organisation:</p>	<p>Welcome: Children to enter to "The Lord is my shepherd" by Stuart Townsend - The Lord's My Shepherd - Stuart Townend Light the candle and open with the school liturgy. Explain worship is to be inclusive, invitational and inspirational.</p> <p>Learn: Today we're thinking about something really important for our school and our country: British Values. These values help us live well together, treat each other fairly, and make our community a brighter place. And of course, all of this links beautifully to our school motto: Shine Like Stars. British Values aren't just rules. They're ways of living that help everyone feel safe, respected, and valued.</p>

<p>Sit in rows</p>	<p>They help us shine, just like stars in the sky, bringing light wherever we go. The five British Values are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Democracy • Rule of Law • Individual Liberty • Mutual Respect • Tolerance of those with different faiths and belief. <p>Each one connects to the way Jesus taught people to live, and each one helps us shine in our school, our homes, and our world. Bible Story Link: Jesus Calls Matthew (Matthew 9:9-13). This story shows us something powerful: Jesus welcomed people others ignored. He treated everyone with dignity. He gave people freedom to change. He showed respect, fairness, and love. That's exactly what British Values are about. Respond: Work together to link the British values to what it means for us as a Christian School - see detailed plan. This will take the next few worships. Reflect: Think of one British Value you want to shine with this week. Maybe you want to listen more carefully. Maybe you want to show respect on the playground. Maybe you want to be brave enough to make a good choice. Hold that thought like a star in your mind <i>Dear God,</i> <i>Thank you for our school and our community.</i> <i>Help us to shine like stars by living out British Values—</i> <i>to listen, to respect, to welcome, to choose wisely,</i> <i>and to treat everyone with kindness.</i> <i>Help us follow the example of Jesus,</i> <i>who showed love to all. Amen.</i> Take Away/next steps: As you go into today, remember: YOou don't shine by being perfect. You shine by choosing kindness, fairness, and respect. You shine by being the light someone else needs. Go and shine like stars.</p>

Summer Term

Week 2- 20th April **White/Gold cloth on worship table**

Monday Worship	Welcome: Children to enter to "The Lord is my shepherd" by Stuart Townsend - The Lord's My Shepherd - Stuart Townend . Light the candle and open with the school liturgy. Explain worship is to be inclusive, invitational and inspirational.
Focus: Global Christianity	Learn: Today we're exploring something amazing: Christianity is a global family . Millions of people follow Jesus, but they don't all look the same, speak the same language, or worship in the same way. Christianity is like a huge, colourful patchwork quilt made from every country on Earth. Link to a new display for us to keep adding too.
Organisation: sit in rows	Show a world map and briefly give an overview of each continent: Christianity in Africa - in countries like Kenya, Nigeria, and Ethiopia , churches are full of singing, dancing, and drums. Children often join in with joyful movement and call-and-response songs. Christians there remind us that worship can be full of energy and celebration. Christianity in South America - in places like Brazil and Peru , Christians celebrate big festivals such as Easter with colourful parades. Families gather for food, music, and prayer. They show us that faith can bring whole communities together. Christianity in Asia - in South Korea , many Christians pray early in the morning before school or work. In India , Christians might worship in Tamil, Hindi, Malayalam, or English. They remind us that prayer can be peaceful, quiet, and thoughtful. Christianity in Europe - in the UK and across Europe, Christians worship in churches, schools, cathedrals, and even outdoors. Some churches are hundreds of years old; others meet in modern buildings. This shows us that faith can be ancient and modern at the same time.
	Today we're travelling to Poland , a country in Europe where Christians celebrate something very unusual the day after Easter. It's joyful, noisy, and a bit messy and it reminds people of new life and fresh starts. Use the water pistols to wet the children. Explain that the Monday after Easter Sunday is called Śmigus-Dyngus , or Wet Monday . Children and adults take part in a playful tradition: Śmigus Dyngus aka Wet Monday in Poland euronews GB
	Ask - Why water? Water is a symbol of new life, fresh beginnings and baptism which is important in Christianity. After Easter, Christians celebrate Jesus' resurrection: a moment of hope and new beginnings. Wet Monday is a joyful way to remember that. Respond: What does this celebration teach us?
	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Faith can be joyful• Traditions can be different but still meaningful• Christians around the world celebrate Easter in their own special ways
	Reflect: Despite all the differences, Christians around the world share the same belief in Jesus, a love for others, prayer, hope and value community. It is like many different instruments playing the same song. Shine Jesus Shine - no matter where we live, Christians try to shine like Jesus. <i>Dear God, Thank you for Christians all over the world who worship you in many different ways. Help us to appreciate and respect people from every culture and country. Make us kind, curious, and open-hearted. Amen.</i>
	Take Away/next steps: What can we learn from Christians who worship differently from us? Children contribute to the Worship Reflection Journal.

<p>Tuesday Worship</p> <p>Focus: British Values</p> <p>Organisation: Sit in rows then move to circles.</p>	<p>Welcome: Children to enter to "The Lord is my shepherd" by Stuart Townsend - The Lord's My Shepherd - Stuart Townend Light the candle and open with the school liturgy. Explain worship is to be inclusive, invitational and inspirational.</p> <p>Learn: Recap on the British Values from our worship last week - what are they? What do they represent? Why is this important?</p> <p>Introduce 'Individual Liberty' and ask the pupils to consider what this means. Share prior learning. Link to our school vision - where can you see individual liberty. Teach/explain using the power point saved in resources.</p> <p>Respond: Move the pupils into circles and give each group a worship back pack. Select a lead from each group from the Ethos Committee. Ask the group to get out the pebbles and placed them in the middle of the circles word side up. The leader picks one and passes it round. Children link the word on the pebble to their learning about individual liberty. Adults will be placed with each group to support. Each child will then be given a pipe cleaner: they can make any shape they wish to represent their learning from today. Give them time for this and then share.</p> <p>Reflect: Shine Jesus Shine</p> <p>Take Away/next steps: Help pupils recognise the choices they already make every day. Summer Term

Week 3- 27th April **White/Gold cloth on worship table**

<p>Monday Worship</p> <p>Focus: Global Christianity</p> <p>Organisation: sit in rows</p>	<p>Welcome: Children to enter to "The Lord is my shepherd" by Stuart Townsend - The Lord's My Shepherd - Stuart Townend. Light the candle and open with the school liturgy. Explain worship is to be inclusive, invitational and inspirational.</p> <p>Learn: Light a candle and say: "Today we are thinking about how Christians celebrate Easter in different parts of the world." Show a world map and locate Poland, reminding pupils of our learning last week. Then show where Ethiopia is. Briefly explain that Ethiopia is one of the oldest Christian countries in the world and many Christians there belong to the Ethiopian Orthodox Church. Today, we are going to learn about their Easter traditions.</p> <p>Tell the story of Fasika:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ethiopian Christians fast (give up rich foods) for 55 days before Easter. • On Easter night, people go to church wearing white clothes. • They light candles and celebrate Jesus coming back to life. • After the service, families eat a special meal together (often including chicken stew and bread). <p>Respond: Can you wait? challenge - Ask children to stay completely still and silent for 10 seconds. Then say: Ethiopian Christians wait 55 days! Was that easy or hard? Why is waiting sometimes important? Traditions can be different but still meaningful</p> <p>Reflect: How do you feel when you've waited a long time for something special? Why do you think celebrating together is important? Christians around the world celebrate in different ways, but they share the same message of hope and new life. What makes a celebration really special? Why do people celebrate together instead of alone? Short prayer: Thank you for joy around the world. Help us share happiness and hope with others. Amen. Shine Jesus Shine - no matter where we live, Christians try to shine like Jesus.</p> <p>Take Away/next steps: What can we learn from Christians who worship differently from us? Children contribute to the Worship Reflection Journal.</p>

Why is this important? Let's see how respectful you are at listening! Do quick actions: clap pattern, spin around and freeze like a statue You showed respect by listening and following—great start! Which British Value do you think our focus will be on today? Introduce Mutual Respect.</p> <p>Play the game - Respect or Disrespect? Ask children to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 👍 thumbs up = respectful • 👎 thumbs down = disrespectful <p>Act out or describe scenarios:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Letting someone join your game • Laughing when someone gets something wrong • Listening when someone is speaking

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ignoring someone new <p>After each: why was that respectful or not?</p> <p>Respond: Pick a few volunteers or have whole group join in:</p> <p>Scenario 1: Someone is different from you (different hobby, culture, or opinion)</p> <p>Scenario 2: Two people both want the same thing Ask: What would respect look like here? Let children act out better choices:</p> <p>Create a Respect Wave - Create a wave across the hall: Each row/group says one respectful action: listening, helping, being kind. Build energy as it moves across the room</p> <p>Reflect: Ask quietly: How does it feel when someone respects you? How can you show respect today? Help us to treat others the way we want to be treated - link to our chosen story.</p> <p>Sing the respect song.</p> <p>Take Away/next steps: Help pupils recognise the choices they already make every day. In each class, create a "Choice Board" where pupils record positive choices they've made and how those choices affected others.</p>

Light the candle and open with the school liturgy. Explain worship is to be inclusive, invitational and inspirational. Learn: Respond: Reflect: Take Away/next steps:
Tuesday Worship Focus: Looking after God's creatures. Organisation: Sit in rows	Welcome: Children to enter to "The Lord is my shepherd" by Stuart Townsend - The Lord's My Shepherd - Stuart Townend Light the candle and open with the school liturgy. Explain worship is to be inclusive, invitational and inspirational. Learn: Welcome visitor Hollie Edwards to the school and explain her role as a vet. Link it to the fact that we are going to be having two new guinea pigs as a school pet and would like to ensure we can nurture and look after God's creatures. How can we do this? Hollie will lead the worship sharing her knowledge. Respond: ask - how can we shine and show respect to our new school pet? Invite the children to complete the reflection journal. Reflect: Link to shining and taking responsibility and sing 'Shine, Jesus, Shine.' Take Away/next steps: Ensure the reflection journal is completed. Ask each class to come up with their own prayer for looking after the new pet linked to the STARS template.
Wednesday Worship Focus: Open The Book Organisation: Sit in rows	This worship will be planned and delivered by New Life Church.
Thursday Worship Focus: Global Christianity	Welcome: Children to enter to "The Lord is my shepherd" by Stuart Townsend - The Lord's My Shepherd - Stuart Townend Light the candle and open with the school liturgy. Explain worship is to be inclusive, invitational and inspirational. Learn: Link back to our learning about Poland and Ethiopia this term. What did we learn about how they celebrate Easter? Does it matter that it is different to us? Today we are going to continue to explore how Christians around the world share the same beliefs, but worship in different, joyful ways. Using the map of the world, locate South America and ask if they know of any countries in this continent. Identify our focus will be

<p>Organisation: Sit in rows</p>	<p>on Brazil - what do you already know about Brazil?</p> <p>In Brazil, Christians often worship God with music, movement, and joy. Today, we're going to <i>create something</i> to remind us that everyone can worship in their own way. Hand out the pipe cleaners. Ask them to create one of these:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A musical instrument (guitar, drum shape, trumpet) • A person praising (arms raised) • A heart (to show love for God) • Or an abstract "joy shape" (twists, spirals, bright patterns) <p>Share their creations ensuring that all of the above are included. What might this tell us about how Christians worship in Brazil? Play some lively Brazilian-style worship music and explain that in Brazil, worship can be full of movement and colour. Link to Psalm 150: praising God with instruments and energy. Even though our shapes are all different, they all show praise—just like Christians around the world.</p> <p>Respond: Teach a simple call-and-response:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Leader: 'Deus é bom!' (God is good!) • Children: 'O tempo todo!' (All the time!) <p>Reflect: Ask - Do you think God only likes quiet worship, or joyful worship too? What kind of worship helps you feel close to God? Emphasise: There isn't just one 'right' way as Christians worship in many ways.</p> <p>Take Away/next steps: In the reflection journal, ask children to comment on what makes worship joyful to them.</p>
